


Season's Greetings.





<u>Update on our local Yorkshire Wildlife Trust</u> Reserve

Harvest and Autumn have been fantastic seasons this year. Anyone with apple trees seems to have bumper crops, and there are lots of rose hips, haws and holly berries




around. Whilst our native trees don't go the scarlet red of maples, the yellows, ochres and bronze of the leaves have been really rich this year. Cragg Vale also has the fanstastic mixed habitat of "moorland fringe." It's so important for bird species like twite or migrant redwing who return in the autumn to the fields below the moor. The low sunshine makes the sedges, bilberry and heather glow as they too turn from green to gold.

Connections to other habitats are really important for conservation. Our wildlife is connected by the River Calder to the Humber Estuary and new plans for restoring marine habitat in the North Sea. Our plant life is connected by the Pennine spine to the work on peatbog conservation where every restoration can store huge amounts of carbon back into the soil. The idea is to restore, recreate and reconnect to ensure local "disasters" don't mean national extinction.

Unfortunately our October workday had to be cancelled but the September day replaced much of the stepped section of the path. During the winter, workdays are planned for <u>day 21st ember and</u>



day 12th ry. We meet at the entrance to the reserve at 10am but wrap up well against the cold and wet!

If this isn't for you then you can still help wildlife by being part of the wider landscape. Cold snaps or prolonged wet and windy days are when wild birds really need a bit of support. By keeping tables and feeders full of seed or peanuts, and providing fresh water for drinking or bathing you can attract them to come to you instead. Leaving a bit of the garden "messy" with a pile of leaves, twigs and branches is great for insects and toads, whilst newts hole up in our stone walls. Don't forget hygiene: clean out your bird boxes so they are ready for Spring, and beware food scraps or you'll attract wildlife you don't want near the house!

Work at Withens Clough Reservoir

Yorkshire Water have recently started improvement works at Withens Clough Reservoir. The project is required to comply with the Reservoirs Act 1975 and is part of a bigger, £60million programme of work at a number of their reservoirs over the next five years.

Reservoirs contractor Mott MacDonald Bentley (MMB) will be carrying out the improvements in two phases.

Phase 1 - Drainage Works

This started in September 2010, and it is hoped that this phase will be completed by the end of this year. MMB require a site compound which has meant that Yorkshire Water have had to close the car park onsite whilst they complete the scheme. If possible, the car park will be opened at weekends

Phase 2 - Overflow Works

From early next year, work will begin to replace the existing overflow structures at the reservoir. This phase of work will take around 15 months to complete and will involve an increase in traffic to and from the site via Rudd Lane. For safety reasons, the reservoir will be lowered for this phase of construction for the duration of the scheme. The car park will remain closed for this phase also. Once again, it will be open at weekends if possible.

Video footage of the full length of the access road has been carried out and damage caused as a result of the scheme will be repaired on completion.

Remembering Thomas Crowther:

Since November last year members of the PCC have been researching one of our first vicars, a very special man called Thomas Crowther, whose plaque resides on the wall near the font in church. He was evidently a much loved and respected vicar who was not afraid to protest about child labour and the terrible working conditions and hours worked in the Cragg Vale mills, even if it meant his family were ostracised by the gentry........

Thomas Crowther - 1795 - 1859

Rev Thomas Crowther was Vicar of St John the Baptist in the Wilderness, Cragg Vale from 1821 until his death on 18 November 1859. During his ministry at the church he became acutely aware of the terrible inhumanities of the factory system of that time, and in particular of the long and gruelling working hours that young children were subjected to. He was not afraid to speak out on their behalf, even from his pulpit, but also at public meetings, like the one in Hebden Bridge on 24th Aug. 1833, held for the purpose of promoting the 'Ten Hours Factory Bill' and for 'exposing the atrocities committed by certain liberal factory masters.' Strong words for a cleric at a time when it was more common for 'the church' to support the establishment. The main speaker at the meeting was Richard Oastler, entitled the 'factory king' by his opponents, who worked tirelessly for the cause of the factory workers. The Ten Hours Act was not brought in until 1847 and then it required further legislation in 1850 to enforce it.


Reminder

Wash Falls, Upper Cragg Brook

Many folk were interested in the Yorkshire Water fencing going on over the summer at Wash Falls so on behalf of the CVCA Jackie wrote to YW saying,

'The fencing and new bridge across Cragg Brook just below Lark hall have certainly stirred up some controversy in Cragg but because it's off the main road it's taken a while for folk to realise what's been happening. There's concern locally about what is happening there and a lack of

understanding about why.

Wash Falls
(pictured to the right) has been used by generations of Cragg kids to go swimming on sunny days and the old stone 'stepping stones' part of the right of way across to the conduit on the other side.



Older residents have photos of swimming there. In fact during WW2 lots of airmen were stationed in Cragg as there was a dummy airfield on the Moor[near Manshead] and they helped to create the pool to swim and jump into, just below the 'stepping stones'.

You may be interested in the YW reply:

"Yorkshire Water Services own approximately 30,000 ha of land, 11,400 ha of which is designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). This land is mainly used for the purposes of water catchment but is generally managed by various tenants for the purposes of agriculture and

/or recreation. The agricultural tenants have to derive a livelihood from the

land and this is of course taken seriously by YWS.

In fact, YWS are currently working closely with those tenants whose land falls within the SSSI and we are investing in these area to generate improvement. This has involved communication and agreement with many parties including the tenants, Natural England, the Environment Agency and Moors for the Future.

The bridge and stock proof fencing that you mention form part of this investment. Other works planned here include bracken control, the restoration of bare peat and the repair of the shooting lodge and restoration of the sheepfold. These works will improve the moorland vegetation, enable the effective management of stock and restore

features of historical interest.

I note your comments about swimming on Yorkshire Water land and would advise you that I am not aware of the Company's consent having been sought or granted for such an activity. You may be aware that the Company has run several campaigns to raise awareness of the dangers of swimming in reservoirs and as such, it is unlikely that we would agree to encouraging similar activities on any of our landholdings."

I doubt the airman ever asked for permission! Many of you will have been down there as kids or with your own children-obviously at your own risk.





Rubbish!

It feels like a lot of what you buy from the supermarket is packaging which goes straight from the shopping into the rubbish. Although you can recycle most things, including plastic bottles, there's always lots of mixed plastic



containers and bags for the black bin liner. Calderdale doesn't recycle these even though other local authorities have started to do so.

Recycling plastic makes a real difference, not just to the litter problem but to the wider environment. It's been estimated that, compared with virgin polythene, the recycled stuff releases only around a quarter of the green house gases and reduces water usage by ninety percent.

CVCN is lobbying the council to get the mixed plastic out of the landfill bags and into recycling. We're also looking into whether there is potential to collect the waste from Cragg locally and get it recycled.

There have been reports from local people that they have seen the waste that we segregate for recycling all being thrown into the collection lorries together so may be going to landfill rather than recycled. If anyone sees this happening, let the council know and they should chase it up.

Windmill visit

For the next meeting of the Cragg Vale Carbon Neutral (Monday 13th Dec) we will be visiting a farmer in Soyland who has had a windmill up for just over a year, which he has been monitoring closely. Anyone who is considering investing in a windmill might learn from his practical experience about the real financial implications. We will be meeting at the Robin Hood Inn on Cragg Road about 7.30pm. All welcome!

The Calder Valley Steiner Education moved to the old Sunday School of St. John's Church, Cragg Vale two years ago. We were previously at St. Mary's Church in Luddenden, but had outgrown the space available there. Here we have

established 2 kindergartens (for 3 to 6 year olds) and two of our four parent and child groups.

We have been warmly welcomed into the Cragg Vale community and we find the surrounding area very inspiring. We hope to work more closely with our neighbours in the future.

In September this year we purchased the building and have continued to refurbish both inside and outside spaces. We would like to say a big thank you to all our neighbours for putting up with the inevitable disruption. From next September (2011) we will be extending our provision in



the form of a Small School to include primary school age children from age six. The new classes will follow the Steiner Waldorf Curriculum, which takes account of the needs of the whole child - academic, physical, emotional and spiritual. All subjects will be taught in an artistic and creative way, developing a love of learning and an enthusiasm for school.

We are currently applying to the Department for Education for Free School status.

We are very keen to develop the outdoor curriculum and Cragg Vale is such a beautiful place to experience the seasons & to foster in the children their innate respect & love for the environment which they share with the animals & plants as well as the people who live & work around them. We would be very interested in hearing from anyone who could offer us some land to rent where we can grow more vegetables & perhaps keep some animals. We would also love to have a base in the woods where we can store some basic cooking (camping



style) equipment & have some shelter from the elements when the weather is very rough. If anyone can help us with this please get in touch.

Lastly we would like to thank everyone for giving us such a warm & open hearted welcome into this community. We already feel so at home here & look forward to getting to know more people & being able to make a positive contribution to this very special place.

Cragg in Bloom!

Sue Hoyle, a local 'In Bloom' judge has given us quite a few hints and tips for getting going [if we have enough interest in Cragg]. She suggested going for the 'Neighbourhood Award' and taking things slowly. Yorkshire in Bloom is all about environmental quality and community involvement. She's done a lot of work in Luddenden; including bulb planting, using split and donated perennials [not just annuals], bird boxes, square planters, compost bins [to create soil], recycling etc. They used scarified lawns to fill line hanging baskets, got locals to sponsor wooden boxes, bushes or trees and incorporated local heritage wherever possible. It's a good idea to take lots of before and after photos and to use pesticides sparingly, as wildlife must be encouraged. We could get more ideas from Copley and Barkisland, who enter themselves in the small village category. Is there enough interest in Cragg- let anyone on the CVCA committee know.
