TURN YORKSHIRE YELLOW FOR LE TOUR

Everyone in Cragg Vale, young and old, gardeners and non-gardeners, is being urged to 'Turn Yorkshire Yellow' for the Grand Départ in July. The Royal Horticultural Society has put together a guide to help you choose the best plants for every sort of display including window boxes, hanging baskets and tubs. More information is available from **www.rhs.org.uk**

Plants can be raised from seed in trays and pots in March and April to flower for June until July. As we can have frosts as late as the start of June, it is probably best to grow plants on a window-sill, in a conservatory or in a greenhouse until they are big enough to harden off outside and are ready to flower. You can then create an instant display of yellow flowers for 6th July!

Hardy annuals or annual wildflower seeds can be sown direct in April and May where you want them to flower at the start of July. Plants can also be bought as plugs or in 2½" -3½" pots in March and April to grow-on somewhere frost free such as a greenhouse or conservatory.

There are many yellow-flowered plants that do well here including yellow poppies and begonias. plants recommended by the rhs include marigolds and french marigolds, daisy-like coreopsis and rudbeckias snapdragons, and california poppies.

Come on everyone, let's have glorious yellow displays throughout Cragg Vale!





16th May to 10th June: Children & Schools In any media but it must be two dimensional


10th June to 5th July: Professionals For professional/experienced artists

BROADHEAD CLOUGH - MARCH UPDATE

It's a while since I did an update and quite a lot of work has been done in the background rather than visible changes to the habitat.

We have started surveying for the baseline of the reserve's 5 year management plan. Over the years the records will show whether the work done to the habitat has had an impact on the wildlife living in it.

Between April and July I tried to put into practice my bird identification skills and carried out the first "Breeding Bird Survey" to find out which species live there. On a very wet training day I learnt how to document not just the bird but its activity and if flying, in which direction. I felt

reasonably confident but putting it into practice proved much more difficult. Once the leaves appeared you can't see very far and I had to learn to listen hard for unfamiliar birds. It helps that some do say their name, like "chiff-chaff", but telling a wood warbler from a willow warbler was tough! Listening taught me a lot more about the wood and despite my inexperience I recorded 33 different species with blackcaps and woodcock

amongst the more unusual.
In 2012 a fungi survey found the meadows were a nationally important site for waxcaps. Last October YWT organized a fungi walk so volunteers could help seek them out. Although the grass had grown too long over summer for ideal conditions we found Parrot, Scarlet and many other waxcap species, smoky and orange fairy clubs and a spikey puffball. In the next few weeks the YWT are bringing in cows from their herd at Stirley Community

Farm to graze it back. When cattle are here volunteer "stock checkers" will keep an eye on them each day. If you are interested in joining the rota I can send you details, or they can be found on posters on the track to the reserve, and in the notice board.

Workdays in the reserve will begin again in April. Dates will be posted on the web site **www.ywt.org.uk/volunteer** nearer the time. Click on the left hand tab for "Workday calendar -Volvox" to find the latest edition of the volunteers quarterly newsletter. THE GRAND DEPARTS 5TH APRIL 2014

How many cyclists does it take to pull a grand piano up Cragg Vale? We can find out on 5 April, when The Grand Departs takes up the challenge as part of the 100 day Yorkshire Festival celebrating the Tour de France's visit to the county this summer.

The brain-child of Hebden Bridge Piano Festival and Yorkshire-based arts company Imove, The Grand Departs is putting together a team of cyclists and pianists to take on this epic and musical feat of strength and endurance. A specially composed piece of music is being written to be performed throughout the climb by pianists of all levels of ability.

David Nelson, Director for the project said: "What better way to welcome 'Le Tour' to Yorkshire than with an audacious musical pedaling crazy adventure? This has never been done before – probably for a very good reason – but we're up for the challenge." A bespoke vehicle called a PianoPorté is being designed and built for the occasion by local sculptor Andy Plant. It will be powered by cycles, with a grand piano in tow, and will probably be as long as an articulated lorry.



The Grand Departs will start with a starting event at St Michael's Church in Mytholmroyd, from 11am on 5 April. It will start the climb up Cragg Vale at 12 noon and could take around five hours to reach the top. Rest and refreshment stops will be arranged for the journey, including at the Ark, the Robin Hood, and by Cragg J&I School (refreshments from the Hinchliffe)



CRAGG BUILDERS LTD

In December of 2012, Harriett Sunderland took over the daily running of Cragg Builders Ltd from her father. So our spotlight is on Cragg Builders Ltd, a successful and well respected local building business and one of the few firms in the construction industry with a woman at its helm!

The Sunderlands have lived and farmed in Cragg Vale for several generations but in 1980 Trevor Sunderland changed direction and set up Cragg Builders. Growing from 'just a handful of workers', it is now a limited company employing 14 local people. Harriett started working there in 2008 and says she has "no idea" what made her move into this male-dominated industry. With a first degree in business and marketing, she talked it over with her dad and decided to find out if she'd like the work and be any good.

Initially employed as an estimator, Harriett studied for and gained a degree in Quantity Surveying – whilst at the same time giving birth to her son! Now in charge of the day-to-day running of the business, her work includes giving estimates, sorting out work schedules, and setting out details of how work is to be done. The



company's work ranges from small jobs, such as pointing or repairing gutters, to full conversions including work on listed buildings, and new build. With a NEBOSH ((National Examination Board in Occupational Safety and Health) Certificate in Health and Safety, she also overseas health and safety for all sites.

Harriett says an aim is to keep developing skills "in order to put something back into the community" and therefore apprenticeships are being developed, with two apprentices currently employed, one aged 16yrs and a 21yr old who has been with the company since he was 18 years of age. It's been important to her to be able to take the business forward because she knew that although her dad wanted to retire, he wanted the business to continue. She says that whilst she wants to develop the company, she doesn't want it to grow so big that it loses touch with the workforce, because knowing all the employees and their families has helped the business develop successfully.

Harriett says what she enjoys most is "seeing everything come together at the end of a job" and "the relationship with our customers". She carries out the important inspections at the end of the work herself to make sure it is what the customer wants: "Our relationship with our customers is the key to giving a personal service and to delivering the very best quality". Although proud of what she does, Harriett has one regret and concern - the lack of women applying for jobs! Although a woman is employed as a decorator, no women have applied for any recent jobs: "It's the 21st century but people are still surprised when a woman turns up to discuss and organise the work". She knows of women architects working in Hebden Bridge but hasn't met other women working in the construction industry. Whilst she hasn't been bothered about working in what she sees as a male dominated industry (she says this might be because at Cragg School she was the only girl in her class and when she did her degree there were only 3 other women!), she gets a bit irked when people assume she is taking over from her dad because she is an only child, or when people ask why her brother didn't take over the business!

She'd like to help children learn about possibilities for women as well as men to work in an industry so important to our economy and is keen to get the message out that there's no reason why women can't work in construction. She says "It's important for girls as well as boys to look at the possibilities for working in this industry" and would welcome an opportunity to go and talk to children in schools.

Finally, Harriett and everyone at Cragg Builders Ltd are looking forward to 'Le Tour' coming through the village "I'm very excited, it's a once in a lifetime opportunity, I think it'll be of great benefit to the local economy – and we want to support efforts to break the world bunting record!"



CHANGES IN OUR CHURCH UPDATE ON THE MAJOR RE-DEVELOPEMENT

A new chapter in the history of St John the Baptist in the Wilderness, Cragg Vale, is finally under way, after several years of discussion and planning. This is another major transformation to have taken place since it was built in 1839, as a replacement for the very first Chapel of Ease, opened in 1815, adjacent to our old Sunday School, now owned by Steiner. Our present church, in those early days, featured plain glass lancet windows; a different East window; three-sided gallery seating; some rather mediocre wooden boxed pews; a central three-decker pulpit and coal fired stove. A small organ was situated, with the choir, on the central rear gallery.

Around the late 1850's the original small organ was replaced by a larger Ward organ, purchased from Halifax Square Chapel. A new Vicar, the Rev. Brookes, appointed to

the parish in 1882, felt some updating was needed, such as re-pewing the church; and replacing the organ and the plain glass windows. In Oct 1886 work carried out included the removal of side galleries; enlarging the West gallery; altering the original Pulpit; and providing a platform for the organ, our current larger Abbott instrument, donated by the Hinchliffe family in memory of their children.

Changes incorporating new pews, new East window and stained glass lancet window and the reredos followed. The 1900's saw provision of electricity, choir vestry and later the re-order of the back of church.

In planning for the future, we want to maximise the use of the church as a place of worship and an asset for the community. A major factor in planning was the size of the organ. It has been agreed, at Diocesan and National organ advisers level, that this organ could benefit from use in a larger building. Consequently we were allowed to get permission for it to be installed at an old Abbey church in central France, located in the Lot area, at Marcelhac sur Céré. This area is increasingly popular with English tourists, who will in the future benefit from our old organ. We expect it to be safely installed in its new home in March.

We are now almost in a position to start internal work along the lines of the plans and artist's impressions on display in the church, together with provisions for a smaller pipe organ. We'll have both modern church and community facilities, such as meeting rooms; catering facilities; and all services necessary for the next generations, as we progress into the 21st century.

TREASURE HUNT

The walk should take between 1½ and 2 hours. Quiz sheets will be available to collect from the Hinchliffe Arms from 1.45pm until 2.30pm and you must arrive back no later than 4.30pm.

Along the route there are small bikes to spot, indicating a stopping place to solve a puzzle and possibly find small rewards! All you have to do is spot each little bike, work out answers to the clues, and enjoy the hidden goodies!

The trail goes through some historic areas of Cragg Vale, through the woods and alongside the river with some steady, but not too energetic, uphill walking.

Refreshments, including tea, coffee and cakes, will be available at the Hinchliffe Arms when you return. You can park in the Hinchliffe car park or if you are walking and want to get the bus back home, the timetable will be available in the pub. Sturdy footwear is recommended for the stony and sometimes muddy tracks.

CRAGG BUSES: USE THEM OR LOSE THEM!

Thanks to the responses from Cragg Vale residents to Metro's bus consultation, we have got a good result for our buses. We have kept the Sunday service, the evening services, and some early services go into
