
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
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News From The Ark

Heuristic and sensory play is play involving natural materials and items you can find around the home. Introducing a "treasure basket" of sensory and heuristic items can help stimulate babies' senses and help to develop hand eye coordination. Playing with a range of different material and objects provides opportunities for babies to explore. This play also strengthens the muscles used to sit and squat and enables children to explore the concepts of shape, size and texture.





Treasure Baskets for Babies

Touch and taste are the key ways babies process information. For babies who can sit up you can include wooden spoons, wooden egg cups, pieces of shaped smooth wood, wooden egg shapes, wooden bangles, wooden curtain rings with any metal removed, pieces of furry material, and squares of smooth shiny material.



Other objects, such as a make-up mirror, a plunger, loofah, a large flat pebble can be put into a low basket so babies can easily reach into it. Heuristic play is guided by your baby, let your child choose what they want to play with and enjoy watching as new experiences are explored.

Broadhead Clough December 2016 update

As I write the trees are still holding on to their leaves which are really vibrant this year. The reds, oranges and yellows are a temporary tropical colour scheme in vivid contrast to our usual "green and pleasant land". Perhaps that's why we relish TV programmes like Life on Earth showing us blue sea and pink flamingo so different from the Yorkshire coast where even its colourful puffins are understated compared with a toucan. As winter draws in our landscape becomes even more muted and reflects the colours of its geology. The Pennines have brown peat tinted moors with bracken and bilberry whilst the Dales are grey/green limestone with moss and grass. Many animals use camouflage as defence, and birdwatchers struggle to tell the difference between similar sized LBJ's (jargon for "little brown jobs"). When things look similar you have to notice subtle differences in the detail. The eskimos have done this with snow. They need to have many more words to convey its risk -will there be an avalanche risk? Will this build an igloo?

In the UK our obsession with weather means although our forecasts use scientific scales there is a rich descriptive dialect for how a day feels. Strong winds are "biting" and poor visibility could be fog, drizzle, or in Scotland "dreich". So it is with wildlife we have the Linnaean classification but still talk about bluebells and honey bees because of a link we make in their looks or behaviour and the effect it has on us. When people foraged, the fruits of edible or deadly plants were named to make us notice the detail of what we were about to eat. Try rosehips or sweet chestnut: avoid stinkhorns and death cap! This year there was a campaign to restore words like acorn and buttercup to the Oxford Junior Dictionary. People were astonished that they had been removed as being no longer relevant to many children. They were replaced by blog or voice mail which had more frequent use. Perhaps this is a warning that we should notice and properly celebrate the diversity we enjoy here in the UK.

If you have an hour to spare during 28-30 January try the RSPB Big garden birdwatch and recognise if it's a wren or a dunnock outside your window!

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Education In Cragg Vale

The Children's Act of 1844 meant all children had to be given parttime education.



The first school in Cragg Vale was in the Sunday school building next to the Church. Half of the children would work mornings and go to school in the afternoons, the others went to school in the morning and worked in the afternoons. Ragged schools were set up for the poor and orphaned children and Dame schools for the very young, not old enough to work.

Cragg Vale school log book begins in 1862. The school was run by a head teacher, an assistant teacher, a seamstress, and a pupil teacher - one of the pupils about 13 years old who showed an aptitude in teaching. However, it is recorded in 1864 that 'the pupil teacher behaved very badly and later that year had broken a window with a ball, he was also found encouraging pupils to play during reading lessons.'

The lessons consisted of arithmetic, composition, dictation, spelling, reading, sewing and singing.

The present school building was built in 1887, the children were given a week's holiday before moving in to the new premises. The school was able to accommodate about 200 pupils but attendance was affected at haymaking time, bilberrying time, and also by the closure of any of the mills.

The lessons consisted of arithmetic, composition, dictation, spelling, reading, sewing and singing. The work was mostly carried out on slates which the children

had to buy. The log book in 1911 says 'a lesson on filling in the census paper was given to the school'. Sadly, it also recorded that 'pupils died and a talk was given to the school as a warning of the uncertainty of death.'

Play time was known as 'all out'. On one day in the 1800's, 'children were marched around the school, as the day was very cold and not fit for all out'. In 1864 the log book says 'a sensation was caused as the pupils were given both a swing and marbles as a treat.'

Lunch time in 1869 is only mentioned once when a boy was sent home after spilling his dinner (milk). School meals did not start until 1941 but school milk began in the 1920s via a local farmer with a pail, it was warmed and served in school mugs. 1939 saw the introduction of milk in bottles. I remember in summer, the birds would have pecked at the silver tops and it would be warm from the sun, in the winter ice would have pushed the top almost off the bottle.

Education is still a great part of Cragg Vale village life. The school building*, now approaching its 130th anniversary, has educated many generations of local families.



Update on Cragg School OFSTED has just confirmed Cragg School is officially a 'good' school!

Following the pre-consultation, covered in the last newsletter, Calderdale Council have approved the recommendation to amalgamate Cragg Vale J&I School with Calder High to create an all through school (4-18 years) on the Calder High site.

The plan is for Cragg Vale J&I to move to the current 6th form block in September 2017. There is now a 6-week formal consultation on this plan with a final recommendation to go to Cabinet on 12th December 2016. The Council website is open for comments, search for: Consultation on Cragg Vale Junior and Infant School. Following the outcome of the consultation there will be a further 4 week period for representations before the final decision is made on 30/1/17.
