Forest School at the Ark



Outdoor play is vital in any child's development and provides the chance to connect with the natural world, experience the seasons, and have endless opportunities for creativity and imaginative play. The countless benefits of outdoor play have a real impact on children's lives, especially during the current pandemic.

Forest School has been a great success at The Ark Nursery. Sessions take place in a woodland area in close proximity to the nursery The Pre-school children enjoy the wild open space, playing in the river, climbing trees, hiding in the willow den and best of all - playing in the mud! The children gain first-hand experience of learning about the seasons, wild life, plants and also have the opportunity to use a variety of different tools such as a bow saw and secateurs. In winter a campfire is lit, keeping everyone warm and

helping the children learn about fire safety. We also cook on the campfire, creating delicious treats – baked apple anyone?

The children have the freedom to explore, play and learn. At this time of year, the children love to go looking for brambles at Forest School, collecting (and sampling) lots of lovey fruit. Then, with the help of the practitioners, they carefully wash and sort the fruit to make jam to have with bread as a snack. Delicious!

News from St John's Church

2020 has been difficult for St John's. We had to close completely in March but started streaming regular Sunday and compline services via Zoom and Facebook. We also moved our Tuesday afternoon 'open church' sessions to Zoom so at least some social interaction was available for those shielding at home. We set up a 'telephone tree' to make sure all our congregation, especially those who we weren't reaching via Zoom, were ok and to help them where needed. Eventually, after making the building 'Covid secure', we were allowed to open for private prayer and started having Sunday services again - very strange with face masks, social distancing, hand sanitizing and no singing! If you'd like to come to a service (9.30am every Sunday) contact the Vicar, Cathy on 883944 so we can reserve you a seat. We are still streaming a Zoom service every Sunday and compline every evening and everyone is welcome.

We're grateful to our gardening team for continuing to work in the churchyard, keeping it tidy where needed and providing managed wild areas. We're part way to being an 'Eco Church' and having wild areas is part of that journey and one we can keep going during Covid

Our 'Sanctuary in the Wilderness' and outdoor 'Wilderness Worship' has been put on hold but we are now looking at how we can reach out to the whole community, especially those who may be struggling with their mental health, isolation or loneliness – watch the noticeboards for more information!

This year to date, we've lost our fundraising events and activities and are not sure when they will resume. The Christmas Cracker is on our calendar for December 11th but we don't know if it will be going ahead. We rely on these events to raise over £5000 annually. We are grateful for the massive donation of over £800 from Shaun Donnelly, raised through his two 'marathon' bike rides this year and last year. This will be used to install a kitchenette in our upstairs room. However, the cost of running the church is almost the same as it would have been if we were in 'normal' times and we need to pay our parish share something all parish churches have to pay to the local diocese which, for us, is over £1000 a month! Our small but loyal congregation give as generously as they can, but we rely heavily on fundraising.

We could really do with everyone helping us if you can! If you usually attend any event, think about how much you might have spent and donate anyway. We understand many people may now be in no position to do so but if you are, we would be very grateful!

News from Calder Primary

Faster Broadband

We previously reported on the slow broadband speeds in Cragg Vale, however, for some this is improving:

- Craggs Energy have set up as a local provider for anyone who has "line of sight" of their premises at the Craggs Business Park. Broadband signals are transmitted via microwaves and come into the premises via a receiver, usually fitted at rooftop level. Speeds of up to 4ombs are possible, which may be a significant improvement for those using standard telephone line connections.

What should you do next?

- 1 Check your existing broadband speed a number of free speed checkers are available via the internet. If your speed is less than 5mbs, you may want to upgrade. if so....
- ② Check the Openreach website https:// www.openreach.com/fibre-broadband and enter your postcode into the "check my availability" facility.
- ③ If your property is included in the FTTP scheme, you can select from a list of suppliers you can get their prices from the Suppliers' websites which are linked from the Openreach site. Monthly prices vary according to suppliers and speeds required, so can range from around £23 for a 40mbs service to £60 for goombs.
- 4 If FTTP isn't available, an upgrade to FTTC may be an option for properties supplied via a copper cable.
- (5) Check your existing broadband contract, you may be able to upgrade if your supplier provides FTTP or FTTC (as per the Openreach site), otherwise you may have to wait until your contract end date if you want to switch.



Broadhead Clough September 2020 update

I last wrote in early February - how long ago that feels when so much in life has changed. During total lockdown we noticed many people walking through the reserve for their 1 hour permitted exercise and it was good to see so many families enjoying their visit. To help people to connect with nature, and to support local communities through social isolation, the Trust have revamped their website with a whole page of activities to do at home https://www.ywt.org.uk/actions with great ideas for you to do all year round. They also released a free, digital version of the membership magazine on their website https://www.ywt.org.uk/wildlife-yorkshiresummer-2020.

Living near the reserve meant in March I was busy reporting back to the reserves officer on the damage after storm Ciara. The heavy rain also dislodged some very large boulders which fell from above, to land alongside and on the main path but these are now stable. It also washed away most of the fascines and undercut the far bank of the main stream bringing down some trees which now have created new leaky dams. Nature of course was not locked down, and it was good to see and hear the birdsong which started earlier with the fantastic spring weather. Whilst all official surveying was stopped, on my daily walks I kept a note of what I heard, with the cuckoo returning, more frequent sightings of buzzards but sadly no definite sightings of wood warblers this year. We also took part in the Great Yorkshire Wildlife Count. This was a "24 hour search into the wildlife on our doorstep" running from noon 20th June to noon 21st and a staggering 4,500 people took part. The results were announced on Yorkshire Day, 1 August via this link www.ywt. org.uk/great-yorkshire-creature-countresults-2020.

Task-days are currently only open to existing volunteers who have been through the "on line" COVID-19 training sessions, and have been "ad hoc" depending on need and staff/equipment availability. The most important habitats were tackled: pulling bracken from the bilberry and marshes, clearing reeds and restoring the water supply before the cows returned to graze the meadows. WATER SUPPLY IN CRAGG VALE



B efore 1960, properties in Cragg Vale obtained their water from a variety of springs and wells. These were often contaminated by animal faeces and dried up in hot summers or were blocked by silt in bad weather. Some water supplies were affected more than others.

Hebden Royd Urban District Council (HRUDC) was responsible for the water in this area but could not afford installation of a mains water supply. This had been talked about in 1944 but had been dropped due to the cost and the Second World War. In 1951 a number of Cragg Vale residents asked the Council to look into resurrecting the idea. On the 19th January, 1953, the Local Government Minister said he:

"fully appreciated the desirability of the proposals, however in view of the present period of financial stress the proposals should be deferred for the time being."

By 1954 a number of residents were getting fed up with being fobbed off. There was a dysentery outbreak in the area although the authorities said it was not caused by the spring water supplies. The Cragg Vale Church Council called a Public Meeting, opened by the vicar, the Rev C N Bateman. There was a large attendance, a Ratepayers Association was formed and my father, Samuel Greenwood Hellowell, was elected Chairman. Grants were available from the Ministry of Local

Government but were hard to obtain. The MP for the Sowerby Constituency, Douglas Houghton, was contacted and he gave

his support. He contacted the

Local Government Minister and it was decided to hold a Public Enquiry in the Council Offices in Hebden Bridge. On 24th January 1956, the Enquiry Inspector recommended the scheme to the Local Government Minister, who gave the go ahead, stating: "The Cragg Vale scheme was practical at reasonable

cost".

Although HRUDC did not have a water resource of its own it could purchase treated water from the Morley Corporation Water Works at Withens Clough Reservoir*. The Contractor for installing the supply was John Cooke of Huddersfield at a cost of £17,500. [equivalent of £305k today] On 13th September, 1960, at Withen's Clough Reservoir, Cllr F.L. Greenwood officially opened the Cragg Vale Mains Water supply!

*Withens Clough Reservoir in Cragg Vale had been constructed in 1890s to supply mains treated water to Morley, around 21 miles away

ROGER HELLOWELL REMEMBERS

Running Out of Water, 1950s

When I was a boy I had a bogie (4 pram wheels with a plank of wood across the axles) and would go up and down Cragg Road on it. At that time vehicles were infrequent and a lot slower! During a very hot dry summer in the 1950s, my father, Samuel, and our next-door neighbour, Jim Duxberry, purchased a pram and made the bogie into a 6-wheeler. I thought it was great. Along with two dolly tubs and four galvanised buckets, we would go about half a mile up the road to Will Clough then up Cow Lane where the stream was still running. We used the buckets to collect the water from the stream and carry it to the awaiting dolly tubs on the bogie on the road. We would then go back down the road manoeuvring a dolly tub outside each house. This went on for several weeks.

Getting Mains Water

When it came to coupling up to the new Mains Water, we dug up the road ourselves, with our own plumber connecting us into



the new supply. We made our own Road Works sign consisting of a dark coloured board approximately 4 feet by 3 feet, with white painted letters saying "Road Up". This was placed about 20 yards in front of the excavation. We borrowed two red paraffin lamps from the plumber." [No traffic light controls in those days!]

[NB Roger was to go on to work for "The Water Board" (now called Yorkshire Water) for 28 years.]

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


















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
