We did it, the speed limit through Cragg Vale has finally been reduced to 30mph!

Calderdale Council have posted notices along the main road, advising that, following the consultation exercise earlier this year, the maximum speed limit through Cragg Vale will be 30mph, from Moorland Cottages down to the current 30mph limit below Dauber Bridge.

The changes apply from 11th October 2021 – look out for new signs and speed checks! Now we just have to make sure the limit is enforced!

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## **Play at The Ark**



#### The importance of heuristic and sensory play with babies

Heuristic and sensory play is play involving natural materials and items you can find around the home. Introducing a treasure basket of sensory and heuristic items can help stimulate babies' senses and help to develop hand eye coordination. Playing with a range of different material and objects provides more opportunities for babies to explore. It can be surprising the length of concentration even babies can show when playing with heuristic and sensory items.

When introducing a treasure basket for babies who can sit up you can include wooden spoons, wooden egg cups, pieces of shaped smooth wood, wooden egg shapes, wooden bangles, wooden curtain rings with any metal removed, pieces of furry material, and squares of smooth shiny material. Objects made just from metal, such as a metal teaspoon, a tea strainer, small and medium metal bowls or a small metal tin. Other objects, such as a make-up mirror, a plunger, loofah, a large flat pebble. These items are put into a low basket so the babies can easily reach into it. This "treasure basket" of items can provide babies with more sensory feedback as touch and taste are the key ways babies' process information.

This is a perfectly safe activity, provided that you choose items that are large and solid enough not to be swallowed and feel the edges to check they are smooth with no sharp edges. Judge whether it might break if it is pulled. It is also important to inspect items each time you put them out to check that they haven't degraded with use.

Treasure basket and heuristic play is guided by your baby. It is up to them to choose which items they want to play with and you can sit back and observe how your child plays. This is thought to help with confidence and help them learn to concentrate for longer, so go ahead and enjoy watching your baby learn through exploring new experiences.

Managed by Lauren, the pub initially opened for drinks only, whilst recruiting a chef to resume kitchen operations.



## News from St John's Church

We feel we are returning to some sort of 'new normal' at church now. We've settled back in to our regular services, try to maintain social distancing in crowded situations, have hand sanitiser everywhere and are happy for people to wear masks if they feel safer doing so and recommend it in a crowded space! Our regular service is at 9.30am every Sunday, followed by tea/coffee and biscuits, all are welcome.

We've started social and fund raising events again. As you can imagine, with no fundraising during the pandemic until July this year, we are struggling to pay the bills that still have to be paid, pandemic or no pandemic.

As well as our usual running costs (insurance, energy, annual maintenance jobs) we also need to have some external pointing done in various places and a few other extra maintenance jobs which have arisen from our 'Quinquennial Inspection', an inspection all church buildings have to have every 5 years to identify any problems which need addressing. We also have to find £15,840 this year to pay to the Diocese of Leeds as our Parish Share (all churches have to pay this, the amount varies depending on location, size of congregation, socioeconomic make-up of the community etc).

On our 'Gift Day' on November 21st we will be launching a campaign to raise money to install a lift from the ground floor to our upstairs meeting room. This will make our entire building accessible to all. We invite you to come along between 11am and 1pm, have a bacon sandwich (VE option available!) and have a look at your church, it is here for the whole community, not just for those life events such as baptisms, weddings and funerals but offers spaces for anyone to use for meetings, workshops, exercise classes, and parties. We have Wilderness Worship on the



first Saturday of every month (except January when it will be on the second Saturday the 8th). All are welcome, we meet outside and usually have an activity such as bird-box building, painting or bug hunting as we celebrate our wonderful environment.

In the run up to Christmas we have various events - see details in the Diary. Please book for the wreath-making evening and for the 'Christmas Cracker' so we know how many we are catering for! You'll have noticed we won't be having a bonfire this year. We are on the path to becoming an 'Eco church' and felt that burning things that can potentially put a lot of pollutants in to our atmosphere is not an environmentally sound thing to do. The valley already has a lot of sometimes guite acrid smoke hanging over it during the cooler months and we don't want to add to that.

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
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## **REMEMBERING CRAGG HALL**

# A look at the talented entrepreneurs and local businesses in Cragg Vale.

## THE ROBIN HOOD Cake Company

A new business created by local lass Joanne Hull, started in April this year when the Robin Hood pub re-opened as covid restrictions lifted. Jo, a qualified baker, was born and brought up in Cragg Vale and attended Cragg Vale Primary School and Calder High where she particularly enjoyed art and pottery, skills that have stood her in good stead as she crafts her amazing Cake Company cakes!

She says baking is in her blood, her Grandparents had a Bakery in Warrington where she worked weekends before going on to study baking and food science in Leeds and Manchester. She remembers how, from the age of 4, she enjoyed baking with her Grandma and says she learnt her profession from her Grandparents including all the intricacies of elaborate royal icing, although Jo says there's not much call for it today! She eventually bought the bakery and ran it for around 11 years before getting involved with helping her parents, Roger and Elva, with the food in the Robin Hood. During lockdown the kitchen was re-furbished and Jo decided it made sense to have it open 5 days a week and to use it to make cakes. She says she's always loved making pies and cakes, although she still helps on her parents' farm and also loves being a shepherdess!



The Robin Hood Cake company offers bespoke cakes for all occasions, designed and baked by Jo. When asked what the greatest design challenge has been so far, Jo said "apart from transporting the cake to the venue without any mishaps, making things stand up can be tricky". Her 'Guinness' cake is a good example where the bottle seems to be defying gravity! She is now creating a surprise 'Elvis' cake for her Mum's birthday – by the time this newsletter is out this will have happened so we're not spoiling the surprise!

Jo says she has her son James to thank for this new venture, he suggested she should do what she loves and bake cakes as a business. All those in Cragg Vale, and further afield, who have seen and tasted her amazing cakes will probably agree it was an excellent suggestion!

As the businesses continue to grow and develop, the directors do not become complacent. 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## Broadhead Clough – Summer 2021 update

Now that restrictions are lifting the talk is all about "getting back to normal", but I don't want that. I want things to improve and particularly I am hoping that the forthcoming **United Nations Climate Change** Conference - COP26, held in Glasgow and hosted by the UK will be a pivotal moment in how we can change behaviour at global, national, local and personal levels. We've seen the recent devastating temperatures in Canada, showing that richer countries are now experiencing the impacts that previously have only affected the poorest. We've always been able to retreat to the shade or find a cool breeze, but some humid areas of the world are now experiencing "wetbulb heat" exceeding 35C or 95F: a point at which humans can no longer regulate their own body heat. People are now migrating to new areas, just as wildlife conservationists have seen animals doing for many decades. In the words of the Climate Coalition a campaign group, "We know the climate doesn't respond to promises and targets: it responds to action." So I'm hoping that the politicians will be galvanized by public opinion to keep their promises, and start producing incentives and laws to deliver results. BUT... it is only when we, over 7.9

PEOPLE ARE NOW MIGRATING TO NEW AREAS billion of us, as communities and individuals change our actions that the climate will respond. This year I felt really anxious as the cuckoo didn't reappear until 3 weeks later than normal, and the number of successful blue tit broods plummeted. In the Great Yorkshire Creature Count I found only one caterpillar, and saw no butterflies in a combined time of four hours both afternoon and morning. In the 60s Dutch Elm disease altered the balance of our woodlands: now Ash, Oak & Box trees are at risk with new pests and climate stress increasing.

### THE CLIMATE WILL RESPOND

So that's why I've been a long-term campaigner, lobbying my MP and other decision makers, and physically volunteering for organisations who are taking action now. At Stirley Farm, YWT are replacing metal fencing with hedges, restoring grasslands and at Spurn Point they are restoring natural climate solutions like seagrass and oysters to naturally clean our seas and trap carbon beneath the waves. Calderdale council are doing their bit with flood recovery plans, tree planting, and reducing air pollution from carbon emissions. What are you doing, and what could you do to make a difference? We all spend time, energy and money so make it count towards "better".

### "Give seas a chance"

The YWT are open to new volunteers now, please go to their website to register. Task-days here at Broadhead Clough will start at 10a.m. on the first Friday of each month. All tools are provided, and gloves if required. Remember sun cream, insect repellent and bring a drink and packed lunch if you are staying all day. You might wish to add hand sanitizer, anti-bac wipes & a face-mask to your bag. Other local opportunities in Calderdale can be found on Facebook: search for "Calder Greening."


### **CROWS:** The Community Rights of Way Service
