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Loose Parts at The Ark

The concept of "loose parts" is what is needed for children to become critical thinkers as they use these open-ended materials to plan and create whatever they want to without an adult dictating to them what should be done. It helps children be imaginative, think for themselves and believe in themselves - they become constructors of their own universe!

There are many benefits to providing open ended loose part resources. It's impossible to use a loose part in the 'wrong' way so there is no sense of failure for children. Children can gain a huge sense of achievement for reaching their own personal goals of their play, experience the thrill and achievement of discovery and experimentation. Plus, loose parts are not gendered and have no stereotypes.



Top ten loose parts!

- 1. Tin Cans** - Cans of all sizes with clean metal edges are typically safe. Be sure to use a safety can opener, one that leaves no sharp edges on the lid or the can.
- 2. Fabric** - Fabric of all textures, this category includes ribbons.
- 3. Cardboard Tubes** - cardboard tubes of varying circumference can be used so many ways.
- 4. Balls** - offer balls of all sizes and textures.
- 5. Container lids** - lids of varying materials and textures. They could be used for filling things
- 6. Egg cartons / to go drink holders** - these are great for holding and transporting other safe parts.
- 7. Tree cookies** - slices of wood of various sizes - known as tree cookies.
- 8. Boxes** - different sized cardboard boxes
- 9. Sensory bottles** - sensory bottles filled with objects for exploring sight or sound. They should be small enough for an infant to grasp. Toddlers enjoy the challenge of larger bottles to carry and roll.
- 10. Pots and pans** - A real favourite of all ages for banging together!

THE LIFE OF A CRAGG VALE POSTIE IN THE 1950S*

Back then, at the beginning of the reign of Queen Elizabeth II, Cragg Vale had its own Post Office and part-time postie. Mytholmroyd was a thriving village with a wide variety of shops, three different banks, and factories, both textile and engineering. It also had a Post Office and Sorting Office, on Burnley Road, where the incoming mail from Halifax was sorted ready for despatch to the several “Walks” ie delivery routes in the local area. Cragg Vale was one of these “Walks”.

In those days, “Walk” did mean “walk”, and the Cragg Vale Walk was split into two with Cecil Greenwood as the regular postman based in Mytholmroyd taking the Sowerby side of Cragg Brook and the part-time postman, based at Cragg Vale Post Office, taking the other side. Cecil’s day began at 5:45am with the sorting of the mail for the two parts of the Walk, before catching the 7am bus up to Cragg Vale where he would leave one bag at the Cragg Vale Post Office for the part-time postie. Cecil would then carry on up Blackstone Edge Rd delivering to the various cottages and farmhouses on the way, before turning left at Sykes Gate and carrying on delivering to the many farms until he neared Steep Lane, where he turned left again, crossing the old Nab End quarries to Hall Bank Lane, arriving back at Mytholmroyd Post Office at 11:20am. He then went off duty until 3pm when he returned to Mytholmroyd Post Office to take a second delivery up Cragg.

Once there, his job continued with the collection of the outgoing mail from the Post Office and post box, along with the other delivery points in the village, namely the Vicarage and the School House, catching the 5pm bus back down to Mytholmroyd. His last job was to empty the post boxes on Cragg Rd and Nest Estate on his way back to Mytholmroyd Post Office. He clocked off at 6pm.

In 1957, the posties were transferred to Hebden Bridge.

The Cragg Vale Post Office first opened in 1856, and remained there, at Bank Bottom, until 1986 when the then Post Mistress, Mrs Reynolds retired, after some 18 years in the post. It was transferred to Cragg Holme, but closed down 3 years later. The photograph attached shows Cragg Vale from those early years. Note the Public Telephone sign at the Post Office and the mill chimney stacks (probably Castle and Cotton Mill) on the left below the Methodist Church.

This delivery started at Dauber Bridge and covered the properties on the roadside back up to Cragg Vale Post Office.

CRAGG CHALLENGE IS BACK!

Sunday the 18th September is a date for your diary. The Cragg Challenge makes a return after two pandemic-driven cancellations. The organisers have also announced that the road closure period has been significantly reduced – Cragg Road will only be closed to traffic from 08:30 to 12:00 on the day.

Royd Ices will be opening up the 'Cragg Challenge Café' once again, providing refreshments for spectators and participants. The events confirmed are as follows:

The Oliver Collinge Climb (Schools Relay) will see our local schools combining once again to form a team that will run the 'baton' up the longest continuous climb in England.

10mile, 10K, 5K runs, plus the special 1mile downhill (John Jones Dash)

Cycle Ascent, 100K Grimpeur & 200K Audax

All events are open to enter now (www.craggchallenge.co.uk), other than the relay where entry information will be managed via schools.

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Broadhead Clough Summer 2022 Update



As I write the bluebells are at their best, and the hard work clearing holly self-sets is paying off as their carpet has spread across the slope. One of the best views is from the bench where you can also see 3 bird boxes and watch the hard working blue and great tits feeding their families. This year our tawny owl box has been successfully used for the first time: our volunteer (licensed to ring fledglings) sent this photo of a young owl still in down. It's the time of year when many young creatures leave the nest, or den and learn to feed themselves independently. Unfortunately this is just at the time when our lawns grow most vigorously and the nation's gardeners mow more often and protect their plants from slug and insect damage. Accidents happen but there are several things you can do to help.

"No Mow May": leaving our lawns and roadside verges uncut for 31 days.

Plantlife and the Wildlife Trusts have been calling upon councils and gardeners to join "No Mow May": leaving our lawns and roadside verges uncut for 31 days. This gives insects as many nectar sources as possible and habitat for their caterpillars, which become food for birds. As a compromise, maybe only mow a path in your lawn, or leave one area long? Then see what wild flowers lie beneath your feet if given time to grow. The Calder Greening project at Sowerby Bridge has now come to an end and Calderdale's Countryside Volunteers will be managing the wild flower meadows and community orchard from now on. The orchard blossom has already passed but the meadows will be best in June/ July.

Around your veg beds, deliberately leave a nettle patch as a decoy. Only use the wildlife friendly slug pellets, and try "companion planting": the smell of mint, marigolds or onions repel carrot fly

It's illegal to disturb nesting birds in the breeding season, so don't go too close, or trim hedges and trees if there are any signs of birds using them for food, shelter or a nest site. If you strim, walk through the area to disturb/warn any creatures before you start to cut and work side to side so they have a way of escape.

Do you know what to do if you find a creature in distress? Many insects revive with a saucer of sugar water; early fledglings are often best left until their parent returns, but providing shade and water could help. If you find an injured hedgehog call the Halifax Hedgehog Society on 07776234929. Hedgehogs regularly travel a mile or more each night foraging, and at this time of year, if a mother is killed crossing a road her hoglets will have to emerge early, or starve. If you see one looking small or listless in the middle of the day the mantra is "Round and sound: leave on the ground. Long and thin: it needs to come in." If you see other injured wild animals the advice is to call a local vet or wildlife re-habilitation organisation to see if they can treat it, or as a last resort the RSPCA.

Task days at Broadhead Clough are on the first Friday each month: July 1st, August 5th, and September 2nd. We start at 10a.m. and usually finish around 3pm. Check the weather before you set out: will it be waterproofs or sun screen? Bring a drink and food to last for the time you intend to volunteer. You might wish to add insect repellent, hand sanitizer and anti-bac wipes to your bag. All tools are provided, and gloves if required.


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
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
