




'LANDSCAPES FOR WATER' WITHENS CLOUGH CONSULTATION

The National Trust's 'Landscapes for Water' project is holding a public engagement event on the evening of Tuesday 4th June at Mytholmroyd Community Centre. They are hoping to deliver landscape restoration work around Withens Clough Reservoir and Turvin Clough. This will include planting trees within the cloughs, installing a series of leaky dams within this area to slow the flow of water off the moor, and deliver community volunteering sessions to help with the tree planting. This is a section of a project that spans from Marsden in the South up to Widdop and Gorple in the North. They are inviting local groups and people from the local community to find out more about the plans and to have the opportunity to ask questions. ANCIENT WOODLAND RESTORATION IN CRAGG VALE

Cragg Vale boasts a significant amount of ancient woodland – woods which have existed since at least 1600AD (around the time of Shakespeare). Ancient woods are some the UK's most precious and biodiverse habitats, covering only about 2.5% of the national land cover (less than half that of private gardens).

In the 19th Century, many local woods were planted with beech to provide bobbin and shuttle wood for the numerous mills. Although native to southern England, beech was planted into these northern woods at the expense of the natural oak woodland habitat. Other ancient woods were partially felled and replanted with



non-native conifers, to provide a timber crop, whilst many ancient woods in Upper Calderdale suffer from invasive species such as Himalayan balsam or rhododendron.

Ancient woodland flowers and native trees struggle to grow under dense shade. With less ground vegetation and limited deadwood,

water runs off slopes too quickly and can exacerbate local flooding. Without action, the special and unique qualities of ancient woods can be irreversibly lost, diminishing their habitat value and local distinctiveness.

Through a project with the White Rose Forest Community Forest, the Woodland Trust contacted several woodland owners in Cragg Vale early in 2023 At Paper Mill Wood, near the Robin Hood Inn, planted beech has been thinned and small groups of locally appropriate species (rowan, hazel, hawthorn, aspen and crab apple) have been planted into gaps. The felling required specialist arborists to climb trees and remove their crowns; standing dead trunks remain, and felled material has been left lying on the ground. Not only does this help slow the flow of water on slopes, but it also creates hugely valuable (and often scarce) deadwood habitat for fungi, invertebrates and other hidden wildlife. Improved light will help ground flora recover on the previously bare slopes under beech. You can read about the work at the owners' blog, https://papermillhome.wixsite.com/papermillwood/.

Liam Plummer, Outreach Adviser for the Woodland Trust, says:

"it's wonderful to work with woodland owners who are keen to manage their woods to address threats. Sensitive work that maintains the unique properties of these ancient woods will encourage ecological recovery, whilst making them more resilient to future threats such as climate change."

If you own ancient woodland and would like more support with managing it, or would like to know more about planting new woodland to help improve connections between ancient woods, the Woodland Trust would be delighted to help you.

Elva Wood: 22/09/1943 - 1/05/2024



On the 1st of May Cragg Vale lost one of its leading ladies: Elva Wood, wife of Roger and mother of Joanne, but known to all as the owner and landlady of the Robin Hood pub. In fact, Elva, beatified by locals as 'Saint Elva of Cragg Vale' when in 2009 she 'saved' the pub for the community, had a very full and varied life and career.

Born in St. Helen's, after school she worked for the Merseyside River Board, then the NHS, then the Police, then Ripponden Parish Council where she was Clerk to the Council and she also worked locally at Sagar Richards. Her last paid employment in 2002 was as an Inspector for the Foot and Mouth outbreak. However, her passion was horses.

'Saint Elva of Cragg Vale'

Iva loved horses, she loved riding and show-jumping and rode competitively to County standard, winning many trophies. Elva and Roger worked together in some events including the Pentathlon with not only show jumping but also swimming and shooting where Roger came into his own!

Later, Elva became a riding instructor and also had horses to 'break-in'. Elva and Roger got married in 1967 and came to live at Bank Top Farm. One of my earliest memories, from when I came to Cragg Vale in 1979, was walking over the fields to collect my son who had been brought to the farm from school by Joanne (she was a 'big girl' when my son started at Cragg school) waiting for me to collect him. Elva was in the field with a couple of horses and, as I started to come over the fence into the field, a shout rang out (I didn't know anyone could shout so loud!) telling me to stop and wait until the horses were brought out of the way! These were two horses that were unbroken and not particularly friendly! Apparently, Elva enjoyed the challenge, Roger told me about one particularly fiery-tempered horse called 'Jezebel' whose temperament he said perfectly matched Elva!

Elva's other great passion was for music, dancing and partying – as many regulars at the Robin will have observed! In particular she loved the music of Elvis Presley. At her 80th birthday party in the pub she was serenaded by 'Elvis', such a night, never to be forgotten, as Elva herself will never be forgotten. So, let's all raise a glass of her favourite port to a great lady of Cragg Vale!

BROADHEAD CLOUGH SUMMER 2024

After a long wet winter, finally the sunshine returned! The oak is definitely out before the ash this year, with more leaves unfurling each day. The fields "greened up" very quickly with the grass studded with yellow dandelions. As I write the bluebells have yet to open in the reserve, but they are flowering lower down on the track to the entrance.

Since I last wrote, there have been more leaky dams installed, but much higher up in the stream so they aren't visible from the path. Slow the Flow is monitoring the impact they are having, but sadly there has been some disturbance of the original work, making it less effective. It may be that the people involved felt that barricading the stream to create pools is not normal, and therefore took the logs away. However, the impact of climate change is no longer "normal" either.

As weather patterns become more extreme, new and unusual management is necessary to avoid devastating flash floods, such as those on Boxing Day 2015. I have contacted the YWT to suggest they install an information board next to the dams to explain and educate how they are helping protect Mytholmroyd from flash flooding. In the meantime, please do not disturb the series of barriers which hold back water so it leaks through more slowly when it rains heavily.

These small interventions are now shown to be highly cost effective. Indeed, Halifax MP Holly Lynch invited Slow the Flow to a reception at The Houses of Parliament, to speak to other MPs on how utilising natural flood management, and sustainable drainage solutions can make a significant contribution to reducing flood risk in communities across the UK.

Another intervention is also being trialled in the reserve to monitor the effect of deer browsing on the regrowth of vegetation. A small square in the wood has been fenced off so it cannot be grazed by deer. This will show how vegetation inside the fence differs in growth from that outside which is not protected from deer browsing. We have also been repairing more of the dry stone walling, this time between the heath area and the meadows so it is secure for when the cows return to graze.

The Wildlife Trusts are once again encouraging people to get out into nature in their "30 Days Wild", now in its 10th year. You can sign up for a free pack with lots of ideas and opportunities for a whole month including the Great Yorkshire Creature Count 2024 on 15th and 16th of June.



Dates for the summer Friday task days are: June 7th, July 5th, Aug 2nd and Sept 6th. We meet at 10am and are on site until 3pm, but leave earlier if very wet. Remember sun cream, insect repellent, food and drink, for the time you intend to volunteer. All tools are provided, including thick gloves.






