Members of the CVCA Committee recently met with our Community Wardens to discuss 2 items of ongoing concern:

Traffic Speeding into and through the village, especially on the downhill side. A speed monitoring crew (including CVCA members) will check out traffic speeds and report the results to Calderdale's Road Safety Team. Further actions will be investigated for problem spots. Any immediate concerns can be reported direct to the Council's Road Safety Team.



Fly Tipping, especially on the upper stretches of Cragg Road appears to be an ongoing problem. Signage will shortly be posted at the layby sites, but residents are urged to keep an eye out for fly tipping (and the culprits) and report any problems, online, to the Council's Fly Tipping Team. The Calderdale Council Website has some useful advice on personal safety and details to report, including photographs.

CRAGG VALE LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

Memories of a childhood in Cragg Vale


Paul Andrews arrived in Cragg Vale in 1949 in the back of a furniture van. He had come to live in the Police House as his father had been appointed the local Police Constable.

From 1949 until 1956, until he was 11 years' old, Paul went to Cragg Vale School. His walk to school took him past Gates End Mill, which he remembers being demolished, and The Sportsman's Inn where his dad often sent him to buy cigarettes. Above the 'Sportsman', Ida Wheelwright sold bread and sweets. Sweets were rationed and Paul remembers the 'coupons'! Further up, at Littlewood, was another bread shop and a taxi service, on Church Lane there was a confectioner's and sweet shop and on the main road the Co-Op that sold 'virtually everything!'

When he was 9 years old, Paul remembers a terrible storm. The heavy rain bounced off the road, turning it into a fast-flowing river that poured down the 'Penny Steps' creating a hole 5 or 6ft deep in the rough ash road at the bottom. Water came through gaps in the stone walls "like jets"! However, from having too much water, sometimes there was none. Paul said "We used to get our tap water from springs that came down the wood and fields behind the houses hence the reason for the row being called Springfield Terrace. Somewhere underground in the back field was a large

tank that held the water till we required some from our taps". The spring water was collected in wells and piped into the large tank but this could become silted up, preventing the water from running. Paul remembered one summer, in an exceptionally dry period, when the tap water stopped altogether. He said "We had to use the pump on the front of the Castle Lodge row which never seemed to dry up. My parents sent me into the field to help Mr Disley, who was small enough to get into the tank to inspect the water level and check if a build-up of silt was preventing water going into the pipes to each house. I was told to assist Mr Disley but not go into the tank. He filled small bags with the sand and silt and tied a rope round them. I had to pull the sacks up out of the tank and empty them onto the field. I remember we had two sessions of this and cleaned out quite a lot of silt before the water started flowing again".

Paul said Cragg Vale was a wonderful place to grow up, especially in the summer when it was haymaking time. "I have really good memories of working in the hay fields at Crumber Hill farm on sunny afternoons until late on a Sunday and listening to Mytholmroyd church bells ringing out a selection of repeating tunes that carried right across the valley". These church bells can still be heard today.

BROADHEAD CLOUGH MAY 2025 UPDATE



Conservation is a seasonal affair, and once we reach the end of March, work in the woodland stops as we enter the breeding bird season. Attention turns to maintaining walls, meadows and heathland, to keep a variety of flora and fungi. This issue, the focus is volunteering: why people do it and what they get from it.

Our core group of 9 locals come from Cragg Vale, Hebden Bridge, Mytholmroyd, and Norland: usually 6 are present each task day. Connor, the YWT Reserve Officer, brings all the equipment for the tasks. In Summer it's mainly clearing bramble, raking /removing reeds, pulling bracken, walling and fencing. Some of us do extra training: for stock checking roles, or surveying, flowers, birds, etc. Experts offer help: one is licensed to maintain bird boxes & ring chicks. YWT staff teach others to become competent dry stone wallers. We chat over tea break and lunch, sometimes with home baking! We all have a laugh, spot and share those unexpected special "nature moments" and gain huge satisfaction in leaving the reserve in better condition, after a job well done. In fact, research shows that time spent outside in nature has a positive effect on health and wellbeing.

In Summer the better weather encourages new people to join us for a single day: May 2nd was a good

example. We had 3 new people all of whom came because their employers offered a scheme for one or more days "volunteering" as part of their staff package. S, doing finance work in Leeds, was returning to Broadhead after enjoying the meadow so much last year, and has now booked another day off, at Ledsham Bank, to help wild flowers by pulling balsam. Two others, came via Swedish company SWECO, who, under the terms of each winning contract, has to give a fixed number of volunteer hours back to the local community. Both chose YWT conservation from a list of various opportunities. . J, from Sheffield normally issues permits for "brownfield" building projects, but wanted to learn how to repair his own broken wall. M is an ecologist, living in Manchester, but seldom gets to actually spend time in the countryside. Both were blown away by the beauty of our nature reserve and went home vowing to come back to Calderdale and do more exploring. We've also had Cragg's own local company, SOL PV Group, bring a staff team out to help us in the reserve.
